## Impressive Line-up of Judges Ready For JMYAC

Music Guild member and JMYAC Judge Coordinator Marian Ciepiela has outdone herself in selecting and securing six prestigious judges for the upcoming Music Guild of New Mexico's Jackie McGehee Young Artists' Concerto Competition for Piano and Strings.

Why do we seek out-of state judges? The judges do not teach locally, so they do not know the contestants, which eliminates any bias. Secondly, the judges open up opportunities to the contestants for participation in summer festivals and university scholarships.

Here are the judges for 2018:

Hyperion Knight, Piano, is a soloist, concert pianist, and recording artist. A native of Berkeley, California, Hyperion graduated at the age of 19 from the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. By the age of 22 he had received both a Master's degree and a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the Cleveland Institute of Music. Hyperion was a judge in the 2016 Competition and performed a benefit concert for us in 2015. Known for the diversity of his repertoire, he is equally at home in serious classics and popular standards. His recordings range from Beethoven to the Beatles.

Jon Nakamatsu, Piano, is a soloist, concert pianist, and recording artist. Since 1997, Mr. Nakamatsu has served on multiple international piano competition juries and has also been invited as a guest speaker at numerous institutions including the Van Cliburn Foundation, Stanford University and the Juilliard School. Mr. Nakamatsu is a graduate of Stanford University with a bachelor's degree in German Studies and a master's degree in Education. He was the featured soloist in 2015 with the New Mexico Philharmonic.

Antoinette Perry, Piano, Professor at the University of Southern California

Former students are enjoying successful careers as performers and pedagogues throughout the U.S. and Asia.

Philip Alejo, Double Bass, is an Assistant Professor at the University of Arizona, has been a Visiting Professor of Bass at the University of Michigan, and taught at St. Ambrose University. A former member of the Chicago Civic Orchestra and mentor with Detroit Symphony Civic Orchestra, Philip has performed with the Quad City Symphony, Tucson Symphony,

Ensemble Dal Niente, Flint Symphony, and Ann Arbor Symphony. As a chamber musician, Alejo collaborates regularly with harpist Claire Happel in River Town Duo, which premiered a commissioned work by Pulitzer Prize and Grammy-winning composer Caroline Shaw at the University of Illinois in 2014.

Pasha Sabouri, Violin, is the Artistic Director of the Texas String Camp. Dr. Sabouri has performed recitals and concerts all over the world and has solved for the opening of the Edinburgh Festival, as well as with the Texas Chamber Orchestra, Las Vegas Philharmonic, Henderson Symphony, the Early Music Ensemble at the Butler School of Music, and the Ottawa Sinfonette. Dr. Sabouri also served as Brian Lewis's teaching assistant at the Butler School of Music at the University of Texas at Austin where he received his Doctorate and Masters degree. He received his Bachelors degree from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. He has also been faculty at the Austin Chamber Music Center and the Brian Lewis Young Artist Program. He performs on a Cuyper Violin made in 1793.

Jeanne Skrocki, Violin, is an Artist Professor at the University of the Redlands (California) and Concertmaster of the Redlands Symphony Orchestra. She earned a B.S. in Aeronautical Engineering from Cal Tech. She has established herself locally and nationally as an outstanding teacher and performer and made her solo debut with the Redlands Symphony in October 2012. Ms. Skrocki continues the legacy of the legendary Jascha Heifetz, with whom she studied at the University of Southern California, and was invited to join the faculty of the Jascha Heifetz Symposium at Connecticut College beginning in June 2013. She is a dedicated mentor to young musicians, using encouraging and effective teaching methods to motivate students to excel and accomplish their career goal.

## Adult Learning Opportunities

Have you ever wondered what the first evidence of music making was? Actually, it was more than 36,000 years ago when Stone-Age people began to bore finger holes in animal bones to craft flutes.

Mesopotamia, which is now part of Syria and Iraq, developed writing about 4,000 years B.C. Shortly thereafter, writing with musical notation appeared on cuneiform (wedge-shaped impressions) clay tablets.

Our modern-day music, whether sung, or performed instrumentally, can actually be traced back to Greco-Roman tragi-comedies, and Hebraic and early Christian chant.

Once we reach the Renaissance (c. 1400) Baroque (c.1600),

Classical (c. 1750) etc., we also find art, dance, and architecture closely paralleling music and thus being named in the same manner.

Why do we bring up all of the above facts? Because the Music Guild would like to whet your appetite for more of the above. The Education Committee of the Guild would like to offer a series of lectures about music and the intertwining of art, dance, and architecture. Hopefully, we can work with other organizations, knowledgeable people and institutions to increase your knowledge.
