The Sounds of Music, this year's Ball theme, was certainly a festive occasion. The evening began at 6 p.m. with complimentary champagne courtesy of the Sandia Resort. The Crescendo in musical terms is a “gradual building of volume.” This award honors those who have been unwavering supporters of the Guild and whose involvement has been a Crescendo of support.

The winner of this year’s Crescendo Award is long-time friend, member, and supporter of the Guild, Ann Mulhern. Ann founded Mulhern & Co. Advertising in 1985 to provide cost-effective and innovative advertising to the unique New Mexico market.

The Texas Association for Symphony Orchestras (TASO) was formed in 1965 to provide a forum for the exchange of ideas to develop, support, and promote the interest and growth of symphony orchestras. Every year TASO meets in a different locale to sharpen volunteers' skills in supporting the arts. This year Teri Fahs and Diane Fleming represented NMSG at the conference in Abilene, Texas, and have returned with many new ideas of how things are done in Texas... **Big... Bold...**
Passionately... and with Extravagant Optimism and Style!

The conference consisted of a series of interactive workshops, presentations, and cultural outings. By day, delegates learned how to raise funds, set up a website, train future leaders, and market symphonies. By night, delegates enjoyed the pleasures of wining and dining in a variety of styles and venues. On Thursday night delegates were whisked off to a banquet at the country club to honor the volunteer of the year, Mary Alice Marshall of the Temple Symphony Alliance. At age 100 she is still playing the piano and giving upbeat speeches about the importance of music education in adding passion and meaning to a joyful life. The delegates adored her vigor and wisdom, and responded with a roaring ovation of appreciation. Friday night we traveled 50 miles by bus to a barbeque at a west Texan ranch. Dressed in Western splendor all of the rhinestone cowgirls sat under large trees feasting on barbeque and exchanging ideas. On Saturday night we traveled by trolley to the historic Paramount Theater to dine on stage before going to the Abilene Symphony. Live performances of operatic, symphonic, or jazz music enhanced each event. However, the most amazing event of the weekend was listening to the talented winners of the Juanita Miller Concerto Competition. The audience

was in a state of awe as Sahun Hong on the piano, Laura Liu on violin, and Eric Choi on saxophone performed on the stage of Abilene Christian University.

We spent every free moment chatting with other participants about how they raise monies for the symphony, run musical competitions, and provide musical scholarships. Each guild has its own signature fundraising and educational outreach project. In Houston children have the opportunity to handle and play instruments with the assistance of guild docents at the Petting Zoo. The Tyler Guild links the library and symphony in a family concert of the Polar Express. Waco's Guild presents Sunday afternoon musicales and refreshments in local homes and churches for a modest fee. All of the above activities are geared toward developing music appreciation, fostering musical talent, and expanding the audience pool. Many guilds sponsor a 2- to 3-year Belles and Beaus program similar to our Señorita service program.

One of the major issues facing all symphonies during the economic recession is securing adequate funding for daily operation and performances. Guilds and symphonies both benefit from working in a collaborative manner to support each other in attracting patrons and approaching government for grants and funding. Guilds and symphonies enhance their image if they align their vision statements and programs to present a united front.

As members of NMSG, we have the unique opportunity and privilege to be on the front line for marketing the symphony and Guild. It is easy to be passionate about our fantastic symphony, so share your enthusiasm with others. Buy a season ticket and invite a friend to the NMSO concerts or a Guild luncheon, and we'll soon have another loyal supporter. In fact, invite your representative to a concert to hear first hand the magic of the music. We need the support of our local and state government to support the cultural heritage of the NMSO. For the love of music, get involved now!

Led by NMSO Music Director Guillermo Figueroa, the orchestra will be joined by the NMSO Chorus, the Albuquerque Boy Choir, soprano Margarita de Arellano, tenor Sam Shepperson, and baritone Hugh Russell. This is a performance not to be missed!

Symphony Under the Stars ~ Stars, Stripes and the 1812 Overture May 23:

A program that has proven wildly popular in the past, the annual "Stars, Stripes and the 1812 Overture" concert will



feature the symphony performing Sousa marches, a salute to the armed forces, New Mexico's official state song, *America the Beautiful*, and more, all culminating with Tchaikovsky's classic.

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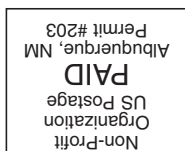
