Social hour from 11:00 am to noon. Lunch and meeting from noon to 1:00.



Some factoids:

- APS has 89 elementary schools and Rio Rancho has 10.
- APS elementary school students have a music teacher every other year.
- This program is offered in cooperation with the Fine Arts Department of each school district.
- Each school is contacted and offered the program.
- Our dedicated docents visited 76 schools this school year.
- It is fun and a great way to meet other committed Guild members

Lets see how this adds up: Specifically, 76 schools with an average of 5 classes per school (some have 2 and some have 10, yes 10!), that's 380 classrooms with an average of 18 students per class and viola! You do the math!
